Homíly notes

King on the Cross

The gospel chosen for the Feast of Christ the King does not correspond to our ideas of royalty. We have recently seen crowds of people queueing to pay their respects to the late Queen Elizabeth II. The gospel

tells us that "the people stayed there watching Jesus" as he was dying on the Cross, not out of respect, but to mock Jesus. The religious leaders joined in the mockery. They challenged Jesus to use his power for his own sake: "He saved others, let him save himself." But Jesus does not use his power in this way. He had declared that he came to serve, not to be served.

One of those crucified with Jesus had the same expectation of the "King of the Jews":

"Save yourself and us as well." He was thinking of his own benefit. The other asked only to be remembered when Jesus would come into his kingdom. Jesus promised that this man would be with him in Paradise. This was surely a gift of mercy, the prerogative of kings.

Some women, including Mary, the mother of Jesus, and Mary Magdalene, and also the Beloved Disciple, "stayed" at the foot of the Cross They serve as our models. We too are called to look on Jesus as he dies on the Cross to save us from sin. We can ask him: "How did you come to this, our Creator and our King?" Each one of us can ask "What have I done for Jesus; what am I doing for Jesus; what ought I to do for Jesus?" With the Good Thief we can ask to be <u>with</u> Jesus, not only in Paradise, but already during our lives on this earth.

We can ask Mary, the mother of Jesus, our mother, our Queen, to help us to love Jesus and to love and serve all her children for the sake of Jesus. Queen of Peace, she can help us along the way traced out by Jesus, our King, a way of truth and life, of justice, love and peace.

Ubuntu

I would like to introduce you to the concept of *UBUNTU*. It is a fundamental life philosophy of the Bantu people of Africa. Many of the Africans we meet in the UK would be of Bantu heritage, in a similar way that most people of

Western and Central Europe are of related heritage.

Ubuntu is a "collection of values and practices that people of Africa view as making people authentic human beings. While the nuances of these values and practices vary across different ethnic groups, they all point to one thing – an authentic individual human being is part of a larger and more significant relational, communal, societal, environmental and spiritual world". (Wikipedia)

Ubuntu, then, means that we should treat everyone with respect and reverence, and this attitude is extended to the animal world and to nature itself. It's a philosophy of life that influenced greatly people like Nelson Mandela and Desmond Tutu.

I share this with you today because I read a report of a *zoom* meeting between a group of university students and Pope Francis, held this week, on the occasion of **World Youth Sunday**, which is today. The students represented countries from right across the Bantu regions of Africa.

In the meeting, the Pope encouraged young people to get involved in their societies. "*Don't limit yourselves to being concerned*", he said, "*but act.*" Young people need to get involved in politics and in the defence of society to put an end to the exploitation of Africa by the powerful of the world. They are the ones who will bring about reform to end the corruption, the violence, the exploitation of Africa's resources and people, which are destroying both people and the environment.

"Don't stop dreaming because when young people stop dreaming that's when countries come to an end", Pope Francis told them.
