Homíly Notes

Jesus would have shared this parable of the good seed and

the weeds when he was reflecting on the life of the community of disciples. There were some living in the community who found it hard to live according to his rule of love. Do not expel them, he would say, but let them grow in love with you all.

Maybe there is another way of interpreting this parable. Jesus could be talking about us, as individuals. For there is both good and bad within each of us. Who does not sin? Who can say, "I am the good person, the good seed of the parable"? God, we know, loves the sinner, seeks out the sinner in his or her weakness, to tell us how much he loves us. God gives us until the last moment of our lives to show our love for him.

It is up to each of us to take time each day to examine our actions and our words of that day and to recognise our sins as well as our good deeds and the integrity of our actions. They go hand in hand. We are both good and bad. Who can be all good? Who can be all bad? The more we take stock of our good deeds, of the moments we have felt closest to God, the more we will be encouraged to stay close to God and grow in God like the good seed.

To examine our day in this way, we need to seek a moment of silence, a moment of prayer at the end of the day. It is only in silence that we can truly face up to who we are, both good and bad, and recognise the hand of God in our daily lives. To be increasingly confident that we live within the kingdom of God, we need also to take time to pray – not a noisy prayer where we speak to God with prayers we have learnt by heart, but a quiet prayer of silence before God.

It is this silence of heart which will also lead us to a greater awareness of God in the world around us; of our dependence on God's love, of the fragility of life and the sufferings of others. *Terry*

Meet Salina

Salina is an organic farmer and seed saver. She lives with her husband, Mogibor, in the village of Gorasin in Bangladesh. Salina shares with CAFOD the challenges that farmers face when they are pushed to buy commercial seeds, and why free access to seeds matters.

"When I bought seeds from the market, my perception was that they must be good seeds. So I tried my best to produce good crops from them. But after I sowed the seeds, after a few days the plants started turning reddish, because they required chemical fertiliser.

So by then, whether I liked it or not, I had to buy the chemical fertiliser or I'd lose my entire crop. Sometimes I borrowed money from my neighbours to buy it, and had to pay it back with interest. Altogether, when I harvested the crop and calculated how much I had made, compared to how much I had spent, I made hardly anything."

"When I was still doing chemical agriculture, at that time I had to buy seeds from outside. But the seed is not just one thing – it is a package. Company seeds always need chemical fertilisers. If you use chemical fertilisers, then you need to also buy chemical pesticides.

"So you end up having to spend a lot of money to buy everything you need for the seeds. But at that time I didn't have much money to buy the chemical fertiliser, pesticides, and buying seeds. So often my land would just remain fallow.
