Our Duty as Citizens

You won't find anything about voting in the Gospels. Jesus says nothing on this topic. He tells us "Give back to Caesar what

belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God" (Mt 22:21).

Does this mean that Christians are not to be involved in politics? In Scripture we read: "For the sake of the Lord, accept the authority of every social institution...God wants you to be good citizens" (1 P 2:13.15). The Catechism of the Catholic Church expresses this in the following way: "It is the duty of citizens to work with civil authority for building up society in a spirit of truth, justice, solidarity and freedom" (CCC 2255).

If it is the duty of Christians as citizens "to work with civil authority" it is surely first of all their right and duty to take part in choosing political leaders who will act "in a spirit of truth, justice, solidarity and freedom".

In some countries voting is obligatory; a fine is imposed on those who do not go to the polls. In this country, no fine is foreseen for anyone who does not exercise their right to vote. This does not mean that we should just sit back as observers, and sufferers, if our political leaders are not satisfactory. As Pope Francis has written in his encyclical Fratelli Tutti:

"Political propaganda, the media and the shapers of public opinion will continue to promote an individualistic and uncritical culture subservient to unregulated economic interests and societal institutions at the service of those who already enjoy too much power" (FT 166).

We should go against this tendency and make sure that we have political leaders who are not concerned merely with their own interests, but who are genuinely seeking the common good.

To return to Jesus, we should remember that he said that he "did not come to be served but to serve" (Mk 10:45). Should we not vote for people who show this spirit, even if they are not Christians?

Homíly Notes

Saturday (vigil)

Do you know that the vine is naturally a ground creeper? For it to stand up and bear

fruit, it needs a carer, who will tie it to a support; who will prune it every year, cutting off the less productive branches, so that its fruit will be full of juice and goodness.

The older a well-tended vine becomes, the better its fruit.

The vine itself, the plant that is rooted in the ground, is, to an untrained eye, a gnarled, dry piece of wood, that would be better dug up and thrown on the fire. But every year, that dry wood gives birth to beautiful green tendrils that produce the branches that in turn produce the fruit. And as we read in the book of Genesis, by staying connected and with careful pruning, the fruit itself is "pleasant to the sight and good for food" (Gen2:9). No need to mention the wine!

Jesus compares himself to this ancient fruit that grew so well in the arid hills of Israel. About to go to his death, he says that he is to become the seemingly dead piece of wood that others would reject and destroy: he is the vine. And, though he will die on the cross, through him, the branches will have life and will bear much fruit. Remain attached to me, he tells them, and the sap that runs through my veins will run through yours, too. This sap is my love for you and for the Father.

It is through us and in us, we who are the branches of the vine, that Jesus, through the Holy Spirit, still bears fruit. Our wine is the faith we have in the Risen One, which will give JOY and HOPE to the world. To produce that wine, we accept to be pruned of all that inhibits new growth. And we remain adamantly attached to Jesus Christ, the Vine. Terry
