

St Paul writes to the people of the Church of Corinth that "he never stops thanking God for all the graces you have received through Jesus Christ. Through these gifts, he wrote, God will keep you steady and without blame until the last day". Are these graces any different to the ones each of us received at our baptism or at our confirmation? No, they

are the same. They are the gifts of the Spirit; wisdom, courage, teaching, witnessing, prophecy and staying steady in the faith, he tells us in today's text. St Paul could be writing to us, here at SVP. These and other gifts are given to us, according to our needs, through the Holy Spirit in the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. That means that we are all gifted, like those first disciples of the church of Corinth.

At the beginning of Advent, we can ask ourselves what we do with these gifts; are they still young and green, like the firtree we put up for Christmas, cared for and well used? Or are they like the decompsing leaves that have fallen from the trees, rotting in the hidden places of the hedgerows and the road gutters? If they are still green, we can thank God for his grace that allows us to keep them that way. If they are turning into mulch, we can still have confidence in God because mulch is a compost that brings new life and our mushy graces can still turn into bright new, green sprouts, and our faith will be renewed at Christmas. The trees of our faith may produce yet more fruit. Jesus came for those whose leaves have turned orange and dark brown or have already fallen and are turning to mulch, to give us new life and new hope.

Sunday Thoughts

Walk the streets today and your cheeks freeze. Imagine what it is like to be homeless, to sleep on a cement floor, to be curled up in a shop doorway.

I am sharing this letter I received from a friend this week. It tells us of the ghastly situation in our city whose services are overwhelmed by the homeless, many of whom are refugees and asylum seekers who are sent to us by an inept and heartless government.

The government is frightened of voters who, themselves, are fearful of strangers who only seek peace and security.

My friend listens to his heart and pleads that we at least tell the government what we think of its policies and attitudes – if it cares. Not all of us will agree on the solution, I know. But we cannot allow the situation to deteriorate any further. He writes:

I have been shocked at the recent rapid rise in the number of people sleeping in tents or in doorways in central Liverpool and in other towns and cities in the last few months. I guess that many of you have observed the same thing. Part of the reason for this is that many of these people are asylum seekers with newly granted refugee status.

You are probably aware that the government has pledged to process all asylum applications made before 28th June 2022 by the end of this year. The government however, made no plans to deal with an increased demand for housing that this fast tracking would create. Moreover, it also reduced the period in which people have to leave their asylum support accommodation once granted refugee status from 28 days leaving people with as little as seven days to move out.

Both, statutory and non-statutory homelessness services have experienced an unprecedented demand for assistance. Some services have become completely overwhelmed and have had to close their services for new clients as the demand on them has become unsustainable. The British Red Cross expects that 50,000 refugees in the UK could be made homeless by the end of the year.

I am writing to ask: if you would also send a personal letter in your own name to the appropriate MPs including your own MP. Feel free to adopt the text of this letter if that is a help.

Already we do what we can on Tuesday to alleviate peoples' pain. What else can we do as a Parish Family? *Terry*
